

ETHIOPIAN OPPOSES ALL AGGRESSION

Told Policy Not Limited to Ethiopia

Availability of Austria and Memel Surrendering to Germany Seen

ETHIOPIAN SITUATION AT A GLANCE

LONDON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Great Britain announced she is willing to go to the limit to prevent "all acts of unprovoked aggression," whether they be in Africa or elsewhere, but said she would take similar drastic action if Germany or any other country further violates Europe's peace.

League officials, in depths of pessimism, said they viewed the council will continue Ethiopia's mobilization without delay.

Paris—French officials noted on Britain's assurance of allegiance to league principles to strengthen national union for a firm stand in the Italo-Ethiopian crisis.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 29 (AP)—Great Britain sternly announced to the world today, by an official note, that her attitude toward league of nations means she will prevent "unprovoked aggression" in East Africa or anywhere else.

In the same diplomatic communication she clearly stated she would ally herself with France in similar action in the further course of European treaties by any or any other country.
